Behind the Scenes

Dear friends in Christ,

Ruth and I just got back from our trip. We had the opportunity and the privilege of taking a trip from Budapest to Amsterdam. It was incredibly beautiful and full of so much history. We found ourselves on the Danube, Main Canal, and the Rhine Rivers. To walk into churches, some of them built in the 11th century, was truly mind-boggling. To see the large cathedrals and witness the reconstruction of many of the towns after the devastation of World War II was incredible.

As with any river cruise you are at the mercy of the levels of the river. Prior to our arrival, there had been little rain and unusually high temperatures. This meant that the river levels were dangerously low. Now, why all this detail? It has to do with what I observed. Because of the river levels the captain, crew and staff were constantly having to make changes. On the surface of things, the operations of the ship and the schedule seemed to be going extremely well. Seemingly all of our walking tours went off without a hitch, the buses that we used were on time, the 900+ bridges that we went under and the 68 different locks we went through did not cause a problem. *On the surface*. Yet I observed all of the various changes that had to be made because of the weather circumstances, and, there were a lot. We did not always know what was happening but the crew and staff were working hard "behind the scenes" to make sure we had a good experience - and we did!.

Now if I "stretch" this line of thought a little, it reminds me of church. Most of us come to church to worship, a good thing. I would guess that for most of us not much thought is given to what is going on "behind the scenes." There is a lot of organizing, preparation, and last minute changes going on. There must be the securing of the preacher, liturgist, organist, ushers, and special music, lights have to be turned on, the sound system has to be turned on and operators in place, overhead screens with announcements and liturgy to be followed, oh yes, and then there is the preparation of the 200-400 bulletins, with not only the service outlined but also the announcements and daily events for the next week. You see where I'm going with this, this all happens primarily "behind the scenes" but they all are terribly important for the work of worship and fellowship in this place.

In yet another area, "behind the scenes," our Church Council, Executive Committee, Church Committees, Mutual Ministry Committee and the Call Committee are all organizing of the work of ministry for Decorah Lutheran Church. And yes, it is always a challenge to communicate all the things that go on here at Decorah Lutheran, but we all must seek to understand and try to learn from all these things that go on behind the scenes, in order that we can do the work of ministry in the name of Jesus Christ in this place.

In a real sense we could also look at the life of Jesus in this way. On the surface we see a person who came into this earth who lived and died, but, there is so much more "behind the scenes" in the life of Jesus. It takes an openness and desire to understand why Jesus came to this earth, why His teachings are so important for all of humankind, why the sacrifice of His life on the cross was so crucial for us, why the resurrection is absolutely **the most important thing** for each and everyone of us, and what this all ultimately means to you and to me. But, it is much more than just understanding what it "means" to you and to me, it also is important to recognize what we are called to do and to be as Christ followers! We are invited to be a part of the church, the fellowship of believers, called not only to faith in Christ on a personal level but also to live our lives in such a way that others may know importance of Christ in our lives as they see it reflected in our lives.

We can talk about the importance of being "spiritual." We hear that conversation a lot in our culture today, but what does it mean? Spiritual? We have many people today seeking to become spiritual, "I am not religious, but I am spiritual!". Implied with this attitude one of the questions is, "What do I have to do?" And there in lies the crux of the issue. For the disciple of Christ Jesus it's not what we do, but it is what Christ has done for us and for many that is the sticking point. **What do we do Jesus Christ?** What difference does it make in my life and the life of my loved ones? There is the basic question not only for us but for a world desperately in need of the saving grace and the love of our God.

So, "behind the scenes" of life, God is working in and through us though the Word, Sacraments and the power of the Holy Spirit. So, let us be faithful and continue the work of ministry being faithful to the written Word and the Lord and Savior of the Church.

Keep Your Hands HealthyA Health Ministry Check-Up

We use our hands countless times a day. From brushing our teeth to typing on the computer to gardening, our hands allow us to perform daily tasks and enjoy many recreational activities. Our hands are a valuable asset that needs to be protected. It's important that we make adjustments to our routines to make sure our hands aren't strained or overworked.

A common hand health problem for those who do repetitive hand motion is carpal tunnel syndrome. This condition happens when one of the major nerves in the hand is compressed or squeezed. It can cause pain, tingling, and numbness in the hand and arm.

Arthritis is a leading cause of disability in America and affects more than 50 million adults according to the Arthritis Foundation. Joint pain, swelling, stiffness and decreased mobility are common symptoms.

Other similar hand health problems include cramping, tendinitis and bursitis. Your health care provider can help to identify what's causing the pain and recommend exercises and treatment that can help.

Prevention is key to hand health. Taking regular breaks is vital. If you're doing "hand-heavy" activities such as sewing or gardening, set a time limit and stick to it. Just because you feel good after 9 holes of golf, don't push it thinking you'll be fine after 18. Keep your wrists in a neutral position and avoid extreme finger and wrist positioning. Finger and arm stretches, shoulder rolls and neck circles also help to break up a long period of sitting in one position.

Decorah Lutheran Library

The 25th Anniversary Edition of <u>The Dakota Series</u> by Lauraine Snelling includes five books featuring the intertwining lives of five inspiring women who live in the early 1900s in farming communities of North Dakota.

#1 – Dakota Dawn takes readers to Soldahl, North Dakota with Nora Johanson who at age 18 has just arrived from Norway to marry Hans Larson. When Hans fails to arrive at the train station that night, Nora finds herself thrown into a life she never expected with people she doesn't know—Reverend John and wife Ingeborg Moen and Carl Detschman, a grieving German immigrant.

#2 – Dakota Dream features Nora's sister Clara Johanson who has been given a ticket to come to Soldahl, including a photograph of a very handsome man. The person who meets her at the train station is Dag Weinlander, a man of few words and smelling of his job as a blacksmith. At least Clara knows she will see joy in her sister's face when she surprises her by arriving at her home.

#3 – Dakota Dusk features Jude Weinlander, the brother of Dag, who is very handsome, but has the heart of a bully and a cheat. When a fire leaves him full of anger and guilt, he leaves Soldahl, wandering from town to town until he reaches Willowford where he finally finds he is needed. He agrees to help schoolmarm Rebekka Stenesrude by rebuilding the schoolhouse before he moves on.

#4 – Dakota December brings readers back to the outskirts of Soldahl on Christmas Eve, with a North Dakota storm raging. Sheriff Caleb Stenesrude finally realizes that his dog has been trying to get his attention to hear another noise outside. When the sheriff climbs over a gate in the blizzard, he is there to catch a woman and her small child as they fall off a horse. Caleb tends to warming up the near-frozen mother and boy when the woman lets out a piercing cry of labor pains. This would be a Christmas Eve like no other.

#5 - Dakota Destiny features Mary Moen, the oldest daughter in the Reverend Moen family, as she finishes her schooling to become a teacher. She and Will Dunfey, an assistant to blacksmith Dag Weinlander, declare their love for each other. However, Will has just joined the army to fight in the war with Germany and was set to leave in a matter of days. Mary writes to Will daily, but receives only a few letters from him before a telegram arrived that he was missing in action and presumed dead. After months of agonized waiting, news comes of Victory Day, November 11, 1918. Does Mary have reason to hope?
